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Literacy

In Literacy, KM have been making connections between our Science topic about 'weather'. Ms Burnet read to KM the story 'Mrs Mopple's Washing Line'. This fun-filled picture book explored the concept of the weather condition of 'wind'. Specifically, heavy winds and where the clothing initially placed on a washing line ends up in the story. KM were able to use the key ideas of; 'Who, What, When, Why and How' to compose draft sentences about their new knowledge about wind. From this, students painted a bright illustration using acrylic paint and portrayed the story. On this artwork, KM placed the published piece of their sentence writing. KM's artworks looked fantastic!

Numeracy

In KM we are always exploring ways to add and subtract numbers. This week we focused on subtraction. We practised multiple strategies to assist in reaching an answer. These included using a number line and manipulatives. KM's main focus was to use subtraction terminology such as take away, less, minus and fewer to assist in explaining their thinking in how an answer was reached. It was great to see so many different strategies used throughout the classroom, ultimately indicating the many ways to find an answer to the same subtraction problem. KM are subtraction superstars.

Technology

Kindergarten students have been learning how to code Dash robots this term. Kindergarten had a blast working collaboratively to guide their robots. Students were able to control the direction and speed of their robot using the Ipad program. Over the next few weeks, Kindergarten will design a course and will be learning how to code their robot to move around this course. So far, the Dash robots have been a hit in Kindergarten. I can't wait to see the creative courses kindergarten will come up with.







point across including the use of high modality words and rhetorical questions. We learnt about the O.R.E.O structure (opinion, Reasons, Evidence, Opinion) which helped the students to remember how to plan and organise their writing. Numeracy

The students in 1/2H have been exploring Volume as part of our measurement unit. We created a range of models using the same number of cubes and compared these models only to find that they each had the same volume regardless of their different shape and form. The students found it interesting that objects with different appearances can have the same volume.



Science

As part of our science unit of study, the students in stage 1 ventured out to explore our school gardens for some creepy crawlies. Mrs Murphy was our support for the day and led this science lesson with a great introduction into our investigative field work. We used magnifying glasses and digging tools to search for, investigate and observe our insect findings. We then collaborated with our peers and hypothesised about the creepy crawlies that we found. What a wonderful hands-on experience for our stage 1 students!







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Literacy

Please save the honey bees, they are endangered because of us humans. If you have noticed, the world is putting weed killer on the plants and flowers. When the bees go to pollinate the flowers, the poison spreads and then they get sick, and then unfortunately they die. Numeracy

We have been learning about volume and capacity for the past week!



Elliot: Capacity is measuring how much something can hold and we've been measuring cups, containers and buckets. We have also been estimating the answers on how much it can hold. Capacity is measured using milliliters and litres.

Kye: Volume is how much space an object takes up and it's measured using cubic units. For example, if we made a giraffe using twelve blocks and made a cube using 12 blocks, they would need the same amount of blocks (have the same volume) but in a different structure.

Joaquin: We've had lots of capacity and volume challenges this week! Volume is how much space an object takes up and capacity is how much it can hold. I think my favourite is capacity!





In drama we have been learning about contrast, focus, mood, space, symbolism and tension. Contrast is the opposite of something, like when you are happy then you turn sad. Focus is when you give people attention. Mood is an expression on your face, just like contrast but not really. Space is how much space you use or how wide the space is you're using. Drama is really

fun and it helps us enjoy ourselves.

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Over the past few weeks 5C have been learning about informative texts. Students have been analysing different informative texts and have been discussing what makes a good informative text. We have been looking at holiday brochures, BTN, squizkids and informative texts about animals. Through discussion with classmates, students have been gathering insight into what makes a great informative



text, which they have applied to their own. Students have picked a topic of their choice, and through research have created their own informative brochure. We have had a variety of topics ranging from animals, weather, sport and countries. It has been great to see the students thrive at this task, as they are researching a topic that interests them.



Numeracy

Students have been looking at multi-step word problems and focusing on how to pull apart the question. Students have been working together and individually during their group rotations. They have been asked to create and answer their own multi-step word problems using two operations in their problems. We have been closely working on the language that is used in a word problem and how they can use this language into their own word problems. It has been such a fun task and it's been great to see the differentiated word problems the students have come up with.

Drama

Mime has a misconception of being a boring artform, with the likes of Marcel Marcaeu and Mr Bean breaking those boundaries. The students explored the art of mime through communicating using their facial expressions and body language. We started with a few warm-up games followed by some very intense rounds of charades. The students were then split into small groups and created a tableaux (a freeze frame) of a scenario that they had created. The students thoroughly enjoyed exploring the overexaggerated actions and facial expressions of mime and it was great to see them so heavily involved in the activities.

We enjoyed some special performances from the Stage 1 choir, junior and senior band, junior and senior dance ensembles.
