




Early Stage 1 Update - KG

Literacy

KG have been looking at the text *Banjo and Ruby Red* by Libby Gleeson as part of their learning in literacy this fortnight. Students looked at how the images within the text provide the reader with additional information about the characters, in particular the friendship between the characters in the story. Students also looked at the different adjectives used in the story to describe the body parts of the different farm animal characters. We are looking forward to seeing students transfer this descriptive vocabulary into their writing next week.

Numeracy

This week KG students have been looking at counting collections of objects, including strategies for organising objects to make them easier to count. After some hands on investigation, KG decided that breaking a large group into a smaller group, such as groups of 5 or ten, makes things much easier to count. Students have also been developing their number sense through daily activities. This week students used an addition think mat to show different ways of representing their friends of ten, and other number combinations.







Science

This term Kindergarten are learning about living things and how farms help us to meet our needs. This week in Science, KG discussed needs and wants. Together they decided that a need is something that you need to keep you alive, and a want is something that you do not need, but is nice to have. After sorting, KG then drew and wrote about the things that they








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
Stage 1 Update - 1W


Literacy

This week, 1W have been reading "The Brothers Quibble" by Aaron Blabey. The author tells a familiar tale of sibling rivalry when a new baby arrives to steal the attention of mum and dad. We explored how the author created the characters and how they changed throughout the book. In the end, Aaron Blabey shows the unconditional love that a young boy holds for his big brother.









Numeracy

This week we have been developing our understanding about the relationship between equivalence, the same as and balance. We have proved that 4 tens and 5 ones equals 3 tens and 15 ones by building with multilink cubes and then breaking them apart and by proving that they balance on an equal arm balance. We can also record this relationship using diagrams and words.


Drama

As we explore characters in literacy, we have deepened our understanding through role play in drama activities. This term we will participate in drama games to show emotion in characters and to perform through other characters' perspectives. We will have the opportunity to perform aboriginal stories and explore the physicality of different animals using our bodies to create various animals.



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




Stage 2 Update - 3W

Literacy

This term in literacy, students in 3W and Stage 2 will be learning about informative texts and our work will be closely linked to our geography unit. Students will be immersed in quality literature based on habitats and animals from around this country. For the first half of the term, 3W will be looking at Australian Reefs and the sea life that live within them. Students will be learning about text features of an informative text and how to include them within their own writing. Here are some of the beautiful books we will be reading.



Numeracy

Students in 3W have dived into the world of 2D shapes! We have discussed the properties and attributes of special quadrilaterals, including parallelograms, rectangles, rhombuses, squares, trapeziums and kites. We have looked at regular and irregular shapes, drawing representations of various shapes in different orientations and constructing these shapes using a variety of materials. Students have thoroughly enjoyed these lessons as they have been hands-on, involving games and activities requiring them to problem solve and investigate as a team.


Geography

This term our Geography unit is 'The Australian Continent'. Students will be learning about what makes Australia a unique country by discussing its varied natural and man-made features. Towards the end of the term, students will participate in a small group project where they will need to choose, research and present one unique place in Australia in a fun in-class competition 'Australia's Got Talent!'

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Stage 3 Update - 5B

Literacy

It has been an interesting start to Term 3, for class 5B, who have been busy creating a fictional character. This character will drive their narrative stories, which students will work on throughout the term. We have some great characters, such as homeless dogs, kids who get sucked into video games, orphan superheroes and all manner of wonderfully creative beings.

Numeracy

We started the term collecting and collating data. Students then presented that data in the most appropriate format: bar graphs; dot plots; line graphs and pie charts. In Week 2 we moved onto one of the tricker mathematical concepts - division. Students have been learning about the relationship between division and multiplication and how their times-tables can help with division.

Visual Art

With the 2023 CPPS Art Show getting closer and closer, we will be very busy this term studying our artist and her style. Julia Flanagan is a fantastic local painter and sculptor whose style is mix of abstract shapes and colourful collages. We are looking forward to the inspiration her art will provide for our own artworks.

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




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

Peer Support Term 3 - Stronger Together



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This term, our students in Years 3 - 6 will commence our Peer Support Program with Session 1 Feeling safe - Being me! For the next 8 weeks they will implement lessons from Stronger Together - a module that aims to support positive relationships amongst students. Peer leaders will talk to students about their strengths and their resilience, discuss positive relationships or friendships and what to do if they experience harmful and hurtful behaviours. Our Peer Leaders have been trained and have planned their session using the materials we have from Peer Support Australia that are specially designed for student led sessions. Our Supervising/Class Teachers will prepare students, supervise sessions and check understanding at the end of the session.

Our session this week includes activities for the members of the group to get to know each other by using a range of social skill interactions that promote diversity and engagement in a sensitive yet productive manner. It also establishes a safe learning environment where the peer group feel able to join in, share and contribute to developing a sense of belonging, to better protect themselves from the effects of bullying.

Session 2 - Strong me!

Our session this week for students involved in Stronger Together - our Peer Support module, encourages students to identify their personal strengths as a key protective factor to address bullying and looks at ways of utilising these positive attributes to support themselves and others to build resilience. Parents of participating students might like to ask what they said or thought their strengths might be and suggest some more.

Session 3 - Including others

Our session this week in Stronger Together - our Peer Support module for our students, considers the relationships that students develop and how they can change over time. It looks at the role they play in contributing to these relationships and how the use of power, trust and honesty can change a relationship. Parents of participating students might like to talk about the different relationships that you have or their relationships with family and other friends outside school.

Session 4 - Make the change

Our session this week in Stronger Together - our Peer Support module encourages students to identify any behaviours or actions they feel are unhealthy in self and others. Skill building in identifying behaviours, inclusive practice and developing empathy assist students to transition into making positive decisions to change. This might be an opportunity for parents of participating students to remind your child about when they have handled change well and their skills they could use.

Session 5 - Know your rights

Our Peer Support session in Stronger Together this week looks closely at the rights of each individual in relation to bullying and harassment. It looks at a range of techniques to support those being bullied and encourages them and the bystanders to take action. Parents of participating students could talk with their child about what they would do if it happened to them

Session 6 - Make a choice

Our Peer Support session in Stronger Together this week provides for a series of problem solving and decision making activities to analyse how and why we make the choices we do. It considers aspects of safety and a moral sense of purpose about why we should seek to support others and look more deeply into how our decisions can have a bigger impact than we first thought.

Session 7 - Standing together

Our Peer Support session in Stronger Together this week looks at the impact of how working together as a team with similar beliefs, can provide a barrier to bullying. When everyone is focussed on promoting positive behaviours that respect diversity and individual need, bullying can be reduced. Activities that focus on building the strength of teams and awareness of the responsibilities of bystanders assists in a whole of school approach. Parents could talk with their students who are undertaking the program about how they could help others who are not experiencing good relationships.

Session 8 - Take the lead

The final session in our Stronger Together Peer Support module summarises skills learnt in previous sessions and provides an opportunity to plan to implement further initiatives across the school. Students will be able to identify personal and whole of school goals to further address

bullying and build their own resilience. Ask students what they have learnt and what else they would like to learn about having good relationships. Contact us with your ideas.

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




3-6 Athletics Carnival

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Kindergarten Calmsley Hill City Farm Excursion






