External Validation-collaborative practice leading to excellence.

We are thrilled to share the exciting news of our school's remarkable achievements during our external validation process this term. The school leadership team: Ms Galanos, Miss Giuffre, Mrs Isaac, Mrs Sharma, Mrs Stainton, Mrs Thuell and Ms Webeck met on Tuesday 25 June with the external validation panel including our Director Educational Leadership Mrs Claus, 2 nominated Principal Support Leaders (PSL) and a Peer Principal.

The purpose of the validation meeting was to show how Croydon Park Public School has improved against the School Excellence Framework (SEF) Version 3.

Our most significant achievements were that the school is now **excelling** in **Effective Classroom Practice and Data Skills and Use**. This means that for our students our teachers are using evidence informed, explicit teaching strategies to support all our students in enhancing their learning and engagement.

In the theme of Learning Culture and Wellbeing our school is now sustaining and growing. This means that the school has a strong focus on a) caring for the wellbeing of all students and b) all students making positive progress in learning.






Term 3 begins for students on Tuesday 23 July and all students are expected to return to school in winter uniform. Happy Holidays for now!



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
Literacy

Would you have a rock as a pet?

Early Stage 1 Update



After reading this term's literature including Floof by Heidi McKinnon, When Billy was a Dog by Kirsty Murray and Chip by Kylie Howarth. An animal theme had developed throughout the last 10 weeks, the Kindy teachers posed the question to the students, 'what could we have as a pet that was not an animal?'. Students came up with quite a few colourful answers including; grass, a balloon, a doll, a flower and a cloud but the one that stood out to us the most was a rock.





Numeracy

KC have been learning about how to represent numbers from 1-20 in different ways such as; in dominos, number cards, dice, tens frames, natural materials from the playground and collections of objects. The reason we focus on representing numbers in differents ways is s that students eventually will be able to instantly name the number of objects within a small collection, will be able to use a counting sequence of one's flexibility, to recognise number patterns and connecting counting and numerals to quantities. KC have loved exploring the school environment and collecting natural resources to create small collections that can be recognised without counting from 1.












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Literacy

Stage 1 Update

2S has been having a great time immersing ourselves in quality literature. We have recently been reading *The Story of Rosy Dock* by Jeannie Baker. At first, we thought Rosy Dock was a person, but then we used our Super Six comprehension skills to discover that rosy dock is in fact an introduced plant species. We unpacked how rosy dock was introduced and made predictions about how it was then spread across Australia. We presented our ideas using a mixture of images and information. We made connections between our literacy and our geography lessons, as we discovered other introduced species in Australia and their impact on the native flora and fauna.

Numeracy

In maths lessons, 2S has been learning to use arrays to make equal groups and count large amounts. We have used our skip counting skills to help us and have learned how to arrange rows and columns to count groups more quickly. We can find arrays all around us! We went on a walk around the school to identify different arrays we could see, such as in windows and tiles. We even made array cities to demonstrate our array knowledge.

2S has also had a lot of fun giving directions to reach a goal. We mapped out paths to mystery objects inside our classroom and guided a friend to reach this object. We also had to use our positional language to instruct a partner in correctly plotting different objects on a grid. We did this without our partner even seeing our board, and then compared results to see if our language was accurate. It was a lot of fun.

Geography

Students from all classes took part in celebrations for NAIDOC week in week 10. We found this an excellent opportunity to learn more about local Indigenous culture and history. 2S learned a variety of songs and dances, we received traditional face paint and helped to create a school wide mural. We listened to traditional Dreaming stories and learned how different tools were used to help hunt and gather food.

This has been a great chance to link our learning to our new experiences, as we have been discussing the Aboriginal links to country following our walking tour to the Cooks River several weeks ago. After this excursion, we were able to discuss the natural and man made features around the Cooks River, and combine this knowledge with an understanding of Aboriginal symbols that could be used to point out places and plants of interest in the local area.









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
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Stage 2 Update

Literacy

Our budding writers have been focusing on crafting sentences with rich imagery, specifically about various settings. This exciting journey into descriptive writing aims to ignite their imaginations and enhance their ability to paint vivid pictures with words. In our literacy sessions, students are learning to create sentences that bring settings to life through the use of descriptive language and sensory details. By focusing on sights, sounds, smells, tastes, and textures, they transform simple sentences into captivating imagery. For example, instead of writing "The beach was nice," students might write, "The golden sand sparkled under the warm sun, and the rhythmic sound of waves filled the salty air".

Numeracy

Our young mathematicians have been diving into the world of number sentences with missing symbols. This engaging activity is designed to strengthen their number sense and enhance their problem-solving skills. In our recent math sessions, students have been presented with number sentences that contain blank spaces where mathematical symbols (addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division) should be. This activity encourages them to think critically about how numbers interact and what operations make the most sense in different contexts.

Science


We are excited to share the latest updates from our Year 3D science classroom! Our curious young scientists have embarked on an intriguing exploration of the food chain, delving into the roles of apex predators, tertiary predators, and other crucial components of ecosystems. This hands-on research project has sparked their interest and deepened their understanding of how living organisms interact within their environments.



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




Stage 3 Update

Literacy

5S have been constructing persuasive pieces of writing based on our guiding text, One Small Island. Students have planned and drafted persuasive texts around the issue of protecting and saving Macquarie Island. They have viewed a variety of source material which has enabled them to develop an informed opinion on the issue. Using evidence, students were able to present objective arguments supporting their position, the majority of which sited the precious flora and fauna that needs protecting, as well as opportunities for important scientific research. While they tried to remain objective, students were encouraged to include persuasive devices, including high modality words and to use technical terminology they've learned throughout the term to ensure their writing presents a level of authority.



Numeracy

5S have been learning all about angles. Students developed a proper definition for what an angle is and were able to identify where angels exist in everyday life. Students learnt to identify the different varieties of angles and their ranges in degrees. After some practise, students were able to estimate and measure angles using protractors and sketch angles based on an arbitrary measurement with reasonable accuracy.





5S have been investigating the properties of materials. Students observed and felt a range of different commonly occurring clothing materials, including cotton and polyester. They analysed the different benefits of clothing materials, including comfort, insulation, cost and sustainability. Students conducted an experiment comparing absorbent and repellent materials. They found that cotton is highly absorbent of water and that nylon is highly repellent of water.



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NAIDOC Week Incursion

On Tuesday 2 July 2024, we celebrated NAIDOC Week at Croydon Park Public School. K-6 students participated in workshops hosted by *First Nations Education 'Koomuri Aboriginal Incursions'*.

Students were divided into stage groups and participated in various Indigenous activities such as artwork on canvas, face painting, dance, artefacts, weaponry, bush survival and storytelling.



At the end of the incursion, all K-6 students came together in our school hall and participated in a song and dance show. We would like to thank *First Nations Education* '*Koomuri Aboriginal Incursions*' for an awesome day. It was a fantastic way to learn about the history and culture of Indigenous Australians.

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
Recorder Performance at the Festival of Instrumental Music at Sydney Opera House

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
