

Our last day for this term is next **Friday 11 April**. School resumes



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Early Stage 1 Update

Literacy

The kindergarten children are enjoying learning how to read during literacy groups and participating in the rotational activities. The teachers have been particularly impressed by their ability to follow instructions, complete activities independently and of course, their progression with reading within such a short time. Some of the rotational activities the children have been engaged with include reading, making and writing their camera words as well as single sound phonic activities including making each sound with playdough.







Numeracy

Ask your child to write out the numerals 0-10! This fortnight, student in KW have been doing daily practice on our whiteboards and the improvement has been impressive! Many students who were having difficult with the formation of numerals, including 2, 3 and 5, can now write them. The children have also been building up an understanding that larger numbers are made up by smaller numbers. They have been engaged in fun games and interactive activities to help build this concept.









KLA

This term our CAPA (Creative and Performing Arts) focus has been music. The children have been learning that music can tell a story and composers do this through dynamics (how loud or soft music can be) and tempo (how fast and slow music can be). The children have also been talking about how music can make them feel and interpreting this through drawing and dancing. We have even had time to use musical instruments and play along to different songs!







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Stage 1 Update

Literacy

2L have been exploring the text "Sophie Scott Goes South' By Alison Lester. It is about a nine-year-old Sophie who takes a voyage to Antarctica, with her dad, the captain of an icebreaker. She sails from Australia to Mawson Station in the South Pole and recounts her adventures through incredible illustrations and photographs. 2L have loved learning new things about Antarctica!



Numeracy

Ahoy!

2L have had the best time time exploring and investigating mathematics through a pirate adventure with Captain Beard and Pirate Bonny. We measured, recorded, compared and estimated the length, area, volume, and mass of a variety of objects using informal and formal units. We also solved many problems such as figuring out which flag had the biggest area and how far we could throw a 'cannon ball'.

Sport









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
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Stage 2 Update

Literacy

3T have been exploring the depths below - the ocean! They have read and compared the texts, 'Earth's Incredible Oceans' by Jess French and 'Deep' by Jess McGeachin, familiarising themselves with key features of an informative text, including headings/subheadings, technical vocabulary and diagrams, along with making comparisons between the two texts. They have practised researching and note taking, and have used their knowledge to write their own informative text about octopuses and an animal of their own choice. Students have enjoyed expanding their vocabulary, identifying Tier 1, 2 and 3 words in these texts, which has been fin-tastic!










Numeracy


3T have been learning about fractions. Students have modelled and represented fractions, have been familiarising themselves with related terminology like numerator and denominator, and have recreated a whole from a fractional part. Students have investigated equivalent fractions and have developed an understanding that fractions can extend beyond one. 3T have also enjoyed improving their recall speed of multiplication facts in ten minute maths.




Stage 2 enjoyed their robotics incursion, learning to code a LEGO Harvester robot. Students were given opportunities to think critically and problem solve, to complete a series of challenges using their robot.













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
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Stage 3 Update - 6C

Literacy





Numeracy

Over the past two weeks in 6C, students examined how the requirements of measurement determine the most suitable unit to use. Throughout the unit, students measured and compared lengths using millimetres, centimetres, metres, and kilometres, as well as calculated and compared perimeters of two-dimensional shapes. A key focus was on understanding timetables as an efficient tool for communicating and organising time. Students learned to read and represent timetables in both 12-hour and 24-hour formats, recognising the efficiency of 24-hour time in avoiding confusion between am and pm. Through inquiry-based activities, such as creating and displaying their own school timetables, students developed essential time management skills. This unit not only enhanced their mathematical understanding but also encouraged them to think about real-world applications where time management is crucial, such as in various professions and daily activities.



Science

In this exciting Physical Sciences unit in 6C, students explore the different forms of energy and how they can be transferred and transformed, with a special focus on electricity in our daily lives. They learn about the importance of electricity, not just locally but also in other countries, fostering intercultural understanding. As they investigate how electricity has changed household life, students discuss the implications of using renewable versus non-renewable energy sources. Through hands-on activities, they test electrical circuits and conduct experiments to validate their hypotheses. Additionally, students design a working electrical model of a house, allowing them to apply their learning in a practical way. Students absolutely love this unit, as it not only enhances their scientific skills but also encourages responsible thinking about energy use and sustainability in a fun and engaging way.


